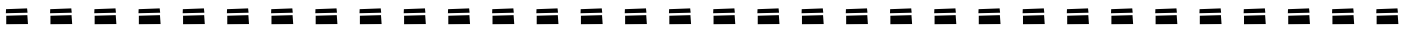

TOSS-UP ROUND

Question 1

For ten points, a dish that is served in Florentine style traditionally includes what green vegetable?

ANSWER: **spinach**

Question 2

Johannes Gutenberg is often credited with inventing the printing press. However, it is more correct to say he improved or perfected it, rather than inventing it. For ten points, Gutenberg's printing press used what specific feature that made it much more flexible than other methods of printing?

ANSWER: **moveable type**

Question 3

Which word is the adverb in the following sentence: "Yesterday Eric drove his dad's yellow car."

ANSWER: **Yesterday**

Question 4

Robert Johnson, who founded the BET television network, is the first black person to be the majority owner of a professional sports franchise. For ten points, he owns what NBA team located in North Carolina?

ANSWER: **Charlotte Bobcats** (accept either the city or the team name)

Question 5

Spain's king Juan Carlos made a historic trip in 2009. For ten points, he visited what neighboring British colony with whom Spain has had limited diplomatic relations for nearly three hundred years?

ANSWER: **Gibraltar**

Question 6

If you suffered from hippophobia, for ten points what would you be afraid of?

ANSWER: **horses**

Question 7

Many theatres and arenas have levels named loge, balcony, mezzanine, and orchestra. For ten points, place loge, balcony, mezzanine, and orchestra in order from lowest to highest.

ANSWER: **orchestra, loge, mezzanine, balcony**

Question 8

For ten points, what artist is famous for a series of paintings featuring sunflowers?

ANSWER: Vincent **Van Gogh**

Question 9

For ten points, the 1984 film *Red Dawn* had the distinction of being the first motion picture to receive what rating?

ANSWER: **PG-13**

Question 10

There is only one sports facility that is home to two different NBA teams as well as an NHL team. For ten points, name this California arena.

ANSWER: **Staples Center**

Question 11

For ten points, Swiss steak, English muffins, and Russian dressing were all first served in what country?

ANSWER: **the USA**

Question 12

“Be sure you’re right. Then go ahead.” For ten points, this is the motto of what famous frontiersman?

ANSWER: Davy **Crockett**

Question 13

The answer is not *Star Wars* or *Harry Potter* or *Lord of the Rings*. For ten points, two of the top five biggest box office movies of all time were part of what series?

ANSWER: ***Pirates of the Caribbean***

Question 14

“It’s filled with mighty pushy people.” For ten points, this is a description of what city that was given by Scarlett O’Hara in *Gone with the Wind*.

ANSWER **Atlanta**

Question 15

Surprisingly, this very religious western state leads the nation in the percentage of its residents who suffer from depression. About two percent of its men and fourteen percent of its women have been treated for clinical depression. For ten points, name this state.

ANSWER: **Utah**

Question 16

For ten points, the name of what South American country comes from the Latin word for “silver”?

ANSWER: **Argentina**

Question 17

For ten points, since the demotion of Pluto, what planet is the smallest in the Solar System?

ANSWER: **Mercury**

Question 18

People who are especially sensitive to poison ivy will also have a reaction to this common nut. For ten points, name the nut which is particularly popular in many Asian cuisines.

ANSWER: **cashew**

Question 19

For ten points, what is the most common eye color in humans?

ANSWER: **brown**

Question 20

Although this drink was first distilled in the 14th Century, it did not become popular in the United States until after World War II. It is traditionally made from potatoes, but today various varieties are made from cereal grains and even soybeans. It is the main ingredient in such cocktails as a Bloody Mary and a Screwdriver. Name this alcohol, whose name is a derivative of the Russian word for water.

ANSWER: **vodka**

Question 21

British chemists William Ramsay and Morris Travers named this element in 1898, shortly after discovering krypton. Its atomic number is 10, and it is a noble gas. The name is derived from the Greek word for "new". Name this element, which glows bright orange when an electric current is passed through it.

ANSWER: **neon**

Question 22

For ten points, what blonde personality has trademarked the catchphrase "That's hot"?

ANSWER: Paris **Hilton**

Question 23

Esperanto is an invented international language. For ten points, all nouns in Esperanto end with what letter of the alphabet?

ANSWER: "O"

Question 24

For ten points, in what year did J.K. Rowling publish the first Harry Potter book?

ANSWER: **1997**

Question 25

"Sometimes I wonder whether the world is being run by smart people who are putting us on or by imbeciles who really mean it." For ten points this is a quote from what 19th Century American author and humorist?

ANSWER: Mark **Twain** (OR Samuel Clemens)



Bonus Round

Starting with the next question, if a toss-up is answered correctly, the team gets to answer the corresponding bonus.

Toss-Up 26

For ten points, what poet claimed that taking “the road less traveled” has “made all the difference”?

ANSWER: Robert **Frost**

Bonus 26

For five points each, give these words, all of which begin with the letter “Q”.

Part 1

This term originally meant to keep separate for a period of forty days, usually to isolate someone or something that is potentially infectious from the general public. Give the term.

ANSWER: **quarantine**

Part 2

The name of this sub-atomic particle originally appeared in the James Joyce novel *Finnegan’s Wake* to describe the cawing of a bird. Give the word.

ANSWER: **quark**

Part 3

The British came up with this derogatory term for a religious group whose members were instructed to “tremble at the word of the Lord”. Give the term.

ANSWER: **Quaker**

Part 4

These rules were considered unmanly when they were first introduced in 1894. Give the name for the modern rules of boxing.

ANSWER: **Queensbury Rules**

Part 5

You may want to remember this two-letter word the next time you play Scrabble. **Spell** the ancient unit of liquid measure that the Babylonians used to measure mead.

ANSWER: **Q – A**

In 1991 Arnold Schwarzenegger became the first person to drive the civilian version of this military vehicle. For ten points, name the vehicle.

ANSWER: **HumVee OR Hummer**

ANSWER: **skin**

Bonus 28

In 2008 Ellison Research conducted a poll asking 5,000 people of all religious backgrounds whether they considered different things sinful. I will name five groups of three possible sins. For five points each, tell me which thing in each group the largest number of people considered sinful.

Part 1

Homosexual activity, adultery, having an abortion

ANSWER: **adultery**

Part 2

Sex before marriage, not reporting income on your tax return, not attending church services regularly

ANSWER: **not reporting income on your tax return**

Part 3

Getting drunk, gambling, smoking marijuana

ANSWER: **smoking marijuana**

Part 4

Racism, swearing, gossip

ANSWER: **racism**

Part 5

Sexual thoughts about someone you're not married to, doing things that harm the environment, watching pornography

ANSWER: **watching pornography**

Toss-Up 29

Since the year 2000 most places in America have gained population. However some now have fewer people than they did in 2000. For ten points, four of the ten fastest shrinking places in the United States are in what south central state?

ANSWER: **Louisiana**

Bonus 29

President Obama threw out the first pitch at the 2009 Major League Baseball All-Star Game. For five points each, answer these questions.

Part 1

Eighteen Presidents have thrown out first pitches at various baseball games. The first Presidential first pitch happened in 1910. What President threw that pitch?

ANSWER: William Howard **Taft**

Part 2

When President Obama threw his pitch at the All-Star Game, he wore a jacket with what team's logo on it?

ANSWER: Chicago **White Sox**

Part 3

President Obama gave two reasons why he wore the White Sox jacket. One was that "everyone knows I'm a White Sox fan." What was the other reason?

ANSWER: **his wife said he looked cute in the jacket** (accept similar answers)

Part 4

At the end of the All-Star Game, a pitcher presented the President with a White Sox cap. That pitcher went on to pitch a perfect game later in the season. Name him.

ANSWER: Mark **Buerhle** (pronounced "burly")

Part 5

Name the city and the stadium where the 2009 Major League Baseball All-Star Game was held.

ANSWER: **Busch Stadium in St. Louis** (both city and stadium name are necessary)

Toss-Up 30

Long before he painted *American Gothic*, Grant Wood worked for the U.S. Army. For ten points, Wood spent most of his Army career designing what type of patterns?

ANSWER: **camouflage**

Bonus 30

For five points each, spell these words that have appeared in various questions and answers earlier in this round.

Part 1

ANSWER: **C - A - M - O - U - F - L - A - G - E**

Toss-Up 32

For ten points, these agreements are named after what Swiss city where they originated?

ANSWER: **Geneva** (conventions)

Part 4

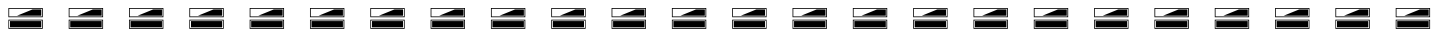
Frisbee
