**Answer:** *Dances with Wolves*

#### Toss-Up 2

For ten points, in most languages derived from Latin, what day of the week is named in honor of the Roman god of war?

**Answer:** Tuesday

#### Toss-Up 3

For ten points, "The Star-Spangled Banner" was written during what war?

**Answer:** War of 1812

#### Toss-Up 4

This common teenage job requires driving a car and carries a high risk of robbery. For ten points, the U.S. Department of Labor ranks what as the fifth most dangerous job in the U.S.A.?

**Answer:** pizza delivery

#### Toss-Up 5

The only interstate to touch both the Canadian and Mexican borders extends from Surrey, British Columbia to Mexicali, Baja California. For ten points, name this interstate that runs near the Pacific coast, passing through Washington, Oregon, and California?

**Answer:** Interstate 5

### **Toss-Up 6**

For more than a century, Dixville Notch has been the first place to vote in Presidential elections. By tradition, the town casts its votes at 12:01am Eastern time, eight hours before the rest of its state begins voting. For ten points, in what state is Dixville Notch?

**Answer:** New Hampshire

### **Toss-Up 7**

For ten points, the hit movie *Slumdog Millionaire* is set in what Indian city?

**Answer:** Mumbai (If the city's former name, "Bombay" is given, prompt for more information.)

### **Toss-Up 8**

A video game hall of fame is currently under construction in a very unlikely location, a small city in southern Iowa, about eighty miles southeast of Des Moines. One of the world's first console video games was installed in a bar there in 1972. At about the same time the city was famous for being the fictional home of Corporal Radar O'Reilly on the TV show M\*A\*S\*H. For ten points, name this city.

**Answer:** Ottumwa

### **Toss-Up 9**

For decades the IBM Corporation had a one-word motto. For ten points, give this motto.

**Answer:** "Think."

### **Toss-Up 10**

Pitcher Randy Johnson is one of the oldest players in Major League Baseball. For ten points, within one year either way, as of July 2009, how old is Randy Johnson?

**Answer:** 45 (accept 44 to 46)

### **Toss-Up 11**

For ten points, the U.S. Army's workhorse helicopters are named after what Indian chief?

**Answer:** Black Hawk

### **Toss-Up 12**

For ten points, according to the *Oxford English Dictionary*, what is the correct **spelling** of Homer Simpson's annoyed grunt?

**Answer:** D – apostrophe – O – H (d'oh)

### **Toss-Up 13**

The song "Happy Days Are Here Again" has been the unofficial theme song of the Democratic Party for longer than most people today can remember. For ten points, whose first Presidential campaign originally featured that music?

**Answer:** Franklin Delano Roosevelt

### **Toss-Up 14**

For ten points, someone who claims to see the future might be referred to by what French term that means "clear seeing"?

**Answer:** clairvoyant

### **Toss-Up 15**

The Rorschach test is commonly used in psychology. For ten points, to determine people's personalities, the test asks them to explain what they see when they are shown ten of what?

**Answer:** ink blots

### **Toss-Up 16**

Generating more than \$150 million in theoretically illegal income in 2008, for ten points what is considered to be the biggest industry in Somalia?

**Answer:** piracy

### **Toss-Up 17**

This question is the penultimate question of the toss-up round. For ten points, what does the word "penultimate" mean?

**Answer:** next to last

### **Toss-Up 18**

While McDonalds has more sales than any other fast food company, it does not have the most locations. For ten points, what fast food franchiser has more than 35,000 locations in 90 countries, nearly 5,000 more locations than McDonalds?

**Answer:** Subway

# **Bonus Round**

If a toss-up is answered correctly, that team gets the opportunity to answer the corresponding bonus.

## **Toss-Up 19**

For ten points, the royalty of what country are said to sit on the Chrysanthemum Throne?

**Answer:** Japan

## **Bonus 19**

For five points each, answer these questions about the most common names for newborn babies in the United States?

**Part A:** For five points, for the past ten years, what has been the most popular name among baby boys in America?

**Answer:** Jacob

**Part B:** For the past fifteen years, two different girls names that both begin with the same letter have alternated for most popular among baby girls. For five points, give both of these names.

**Answer:** Emma and Emily

**Part C:** Until it was replaced by “Lisa” in 1961, for more than 100 years this was the most popular name for baby girls in America. For five points, give the name.

**Answer:** Mary

**Part D:** While still only the 2,409<sup>th</sup> most popular name, this boy’s name moved up a record 10,126 places in 2008. For five points, give the name.

**Answer:** Barack

### **Toss-Up 20**

This country has more pigs than any other nation on earth, nearly ten times as many as the second place country, the U.S.A. For ten points, name the world's largest pork producer.

**Answer:** China

### **Bonus 20**

**Part A:** In the U.S. military, two specific songs are traditionally played to begin and end the day. For five points, name both of these songs.

**Answer:** "Reveille" (REV-uh-lee) and "Taps"

**Part B:** For five points, spell "reveille" (REV-uh-lee).

**Answer:** R – E – V – E – I – L – L – E

**Part C:** "Reveille" and "Taps" can be played on a trumpet, but traditionally they are played on another musical instrument. For five points, name that instrument?

**Answer:** bugle

**Part D:** Like most bugle tunes, "Reveille" was composed using very few different notes. For five points, how many different notes are there in "Reveille".

**Answer:** five

### **Toss-Up 21**

This Arabic term literally means “an object that is safe or permissible to engage in”. It is most often used to describe restaurants that adhere to Islamic food regulations, which are very similar to Judaism’s kosher regulations. For ten points, give this term.

**Answer:** halal (hah-LOLL)

### **Bonus 21**

For five points each, answer these questions about President Obama’s education.

**Part A:** For five points, when he was an elementary student, Obama attended both a public school and a school run by Catholic nuns in what foreign country?

**Answer:** Indonesia

**Part B:** After graduating from Hawaii’s Punahou (POON-uh-hoe) Academy, Obama spent two years at a small college in Los Angeles whose name simply means “western”. For five points, name the school.

**Answer:** Occidental College

**Part C:** For five points, Obama earned a bachelor’s degree in international relations from what Ivy League college located in New York City?

**Answer:** Columbia University

**Part D:** While there was some controversy over whether Notre Dame and Arizona State should issue Obama honorary doctorates, in fact he is one of the few Presidents to have earned a doctoral degree himself. Obama received a J.D. from Harvard Law School. For ten points, what is the full name of a J.D.?

**Answer:** Juris Doctor OR Doctor of Jurisprudence

### **Toss-Up 22**

This U.S. President attended, but withdrew from, the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine. Perhaps if he had finished medical school, he would have fared better after coming down with a cold less than a month after taking office. For ten points, name the shortest-serving President in U.S. history.

**Answer:** William Henry Harrison

### **Bonus 22**

For five points each, tell which element comes immediately before each of these in the periodic table.

**Part A:** fluorine

**Answer:** oxygen

**Part B:** copper

**Answer:** nickel

**Part C:** calcium

**Answer:** potassium

**Part D:** neptunium

**Answer:** uranium

### **Toss-Up 23**

Yellow-colored paper is often sold under the names buff, canary, and goldenrod. Of these three, which is closest to the color Crayola crayons calls “yellow”?

**Answer:** canary

### **Bonus 23**

Consider the Spanish verb “ser”, which means “to be”. I will give a tense and a subject, and for five points each you give me the appropriate form of the verb “ser”.

**Part A:** present indicative tense – “yo” – meaning “I am”

**Answer:** soy

**Part B:** preterite tense – “ellos” – meaning “they were”

**Answer:** fueron (FWAY-rone)

**Part C:** imperfect tense – “tú” – meaning “you used to be”

**Answer:** eras (AIR-ahs)

**Part D:** present subjunctive tense – “nosotros” – meaning “we might be”

**Answer:** séamos (SAY-ah-mose)

### **Toss-Up 24**

For ten points, if you lied while under oath, you would be guilty of what crime?

**Answer:** perjury

### **Bonus 24**

There are five nations in the world that do not have airports. All of these countries are in Europe. For five points each, name up to four of these five airportless-countries.

**Answer:** Andorra, Liechtenstein, Monaco, San Marino, Vatican City  
(5 points each for up to 4 correct answers)

### **Toss-Up 25**

Influenza primarily affects three animal species. For ten points, name all three species that are normally infected with influenza.

**Answer:** Humans, pigs, and birds

### **Bonus 25**

It's been a long time since a horse won racing's Triple Crown.

**Part A:** Boy jockey Steve Cauthen rode the last horse to win the Triple Crown. For five points, name that horse.

**Answer:** Affirmed

**Part B:** For five points, within two years either way, in what year did Affirmed win the Triple Crown?

**Answer:** 1978 (accept 1976 – 1980)

**Part C:** For five points each, name any two other horses that have ever won the Triple Crown.

**Answer:** Sir Barton, Gallant Fox, Omaha, War Admiral, Whirlaway, Count Fleet,  
Assault, Citation, Secretariat, Seattle Slew

(5 points each for up to 2 correct answers)

# Lightning Round D

## Complex Numbers

It will give you ten mathematical problems involving complex numbers. For ten points each, you give the answers. For example, if I said, what is “ $3 + 4i$  times  $2 - 3i$ ”, you would say “ $18 - i$ ”. (Note to reader: “ $i$ ” is simply pronounced “eye”.)

**Question 1:**  $3 + 4i$  plus  $4 + 3i$

**Answer:**  $7 + 7i$

**Question 2:**  $6 + 9i$  minus  $2 + 6i$

**Answer:**  $4 + 3i$

**Question 3:**  $i^2$  (eye, squared)

**Answer:**  $-1$  (negative one)

**Question 4:**  $2 + 3i$  times  $2 - 3i$

**Answer:**  $13$

**Question 5:**  $5 + 2i$  divided by  $5 + 2i$

**Answer:**  $1$

**Question 6:**  $-5 + 4i$  plus  $7 - 9i$

**Answer:**  $2 - 5i$

**Question 7:**  $i^9$  (eye to the ninth power)

**Answer:**  $i$

**Question 8:**  $6 + 3i$  minus  $4 - 7i$

**Answer:**  $2 + 4i$

**Question 9:**  $1 + i$  times  $2 + i$

**Answer:**  $1 + 3i$

**Question 10:** the conjugate of  $8 + 5i$

**Answer:**  $8 - 5i$
